### *Ubuntu: Strengthening Social Solidarity and Global Connectedness*

Data must be collected and reported on the following questions:

1. How do the principles of Ubuntu impact on social work and social development professionals' thinking and actions to facilitate social transformation?
2. How has Ubuntu been applied over the past two years to maximise inclusivity and linking the active participation of all voices, particularly those often marginalised in activities and programmes in social work practice, education, and social development?
3. What are we learning from the use of the principles of Ubuntu to connect indigenous / local populations with a global world?

## **REGIONAL PROCEDURES**

Regions will decide on their approach and event(s) to collect data on the progress made with implementing Ubuntu over the past two years. In principle, the overarching approach is to be as inclusive as possible to represent the social work educators, partitioners, and policy makers as best as possible across the region and sub-regions.

The regional reports are a collective effort on regional level by IASSW, IFSW and ICSW to plan the data collection approach and event(s). The facilitator/coordinator will be the person that makes sure that the data is collected, documented, and submitted to the Global Agenda Taskforce.

The emphasis of the regional reports is on determining the **progress** that has been made in social work practice, education, and policy thus far on Ubuntu in strengthening social solidarity and connecting in the region and globally. The Ubuntu theme is ongoing and integrated in the second and forthcoming themes of the Global Agenda. Hence, the emphasis is on progress made.

The regional reports must be brief and only 3 – 5 pages; in Arial, 11 font, single spacing.
